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Chairman's Message



“As a broad based charity, the vital contribution we provide to the community is only made possible through the generosity of all our supporters.”

2018-19 is an important and busy year for ACCF as we have moved forward to ensure we continue to serve our Mission “To Foster Love, Care & Harmony in the Community”.

In June this year, we launched the ACCF Legacy Fund at the NSW Parliament House. The Faith Family Fund, The Pak Family Fund and St Luke Fund had helped to increase our capital fund by \$750,000. A portion of 2018 annual grant is income derived from the Pak Family Fund and St Luke Fund. On behalf of the Foundation, I extend our sincere gratitude towards the donors of these funds.

In order to better serve the community, a new website was developed and launched in June. It is the wish of the Foundation to offer a more comprehensive and user-friendly website for our stakeholders, end users and service providers. This year our newly formed social media committee had also been very busy. An ACCF Facebook page had been set up as an added communication platform to promote the work of the Foundation. If you happen to come across our Facebook page, please give us a “like” and share our page with your friends.

In September this year, ACCF lent our support to local farmers as the entire State of NSW was gripped by one of the worst droughts on record. In light of the scale of the drought, it was proposed to choose an area that the Foundation can offer direct assistance to the farmers. After much research, the Wollondilly Shire was chosen as the sole beneficiary of this Appeal. This Appeal was called “We Stand as One with Local Farmers – Dilly Drought Drive”. A grand total of \$170,185 was raised for the farmers in the Wollondilly Shire. Thank you to all our generous donors.

Building Community takes dedication and I express my sincere appreciation to all our management committee members, Council Board Members and volunteers. As a volunteer organisation, it is not easy for members to balance work, family and community work. In particular, I would like to acknowledge and welcome four new members to the management committee – Ms Faith Tan, Ms Gigi Chong, Ms Ricki Deng & Mr Lloyd Lu. I am also delighted that Mr Victor Yeung JP and Ms Joanna Ng have agreed to new roles within the management committee as Vice Chairman and Treasurer respectively.

This year we also welcome four new trustees to join the ACCF family - Mrs Rosanna Ng, Ms Terry Teng, Miss Ricki Deng and Ms Queeny Pun. In recognition of the long-standing support we received from The Hon Cr Philip Ruddock, Mayor of Hornsby we have invited the Mayor to be the Foundation's Honorary Vice-Patron. ACCF is very honoured that he has accepted our invitation.

The Funds and Grants Assessment Committee under the leadership of Dr Peter Wong AM has done a fabulous job in assessing the annual grant applications for 2018. There are plans to fine-tune the funding guidelines and to streamline online submissions. Thank you for your hard work.


Through ACCF Mr Warren Lam has pledged \$100,000 over a period of five years (commenced in 2017) to Cancer Cell Immortality Group at UNSW. This generous donation enabled much progress in developing new precision cancer medicines. A detailed progress report by Dr Jeremy Henson is attached for your perusal in this year's Annual Report.

I would also like to thank our newly retired management committee members for the contribution and support that they provided to ACCF over the years – Dr Michael Tse JP (former ACCF Chairman), Mr Peter Tam JP (former Assistant Treasurer) and Dr Anthony Ching JP (former Committee Member).

Special thanks to National Australia Bank (NAB), as this is the fourth year that NAB has donated all raffle receipts from the Lunar New Year Events in the states of NSW, VIC, QLD, SA & WA to ACCF. In 2019, a total of \$27,186 was raised and donated to ACCF. ACCF donated the money raised from VIC, QLD, SA & WA (\$16,701) to Rural Aid Ltd and funds raised in NSW (\$10,485) was donated to the farmers in Wollondilly Shire.

In November 2018, plans were underway to organise an Inaugural Women's Conference at NSW Parliament House. The primary focus of this conference is for migrant women to share their experiences from adversities to achievements. The date of this conference is on 11 June 2019 and a celebration dinner will follow after the conference at Amora Hotel, Sydney. I hope to see you there at the event.

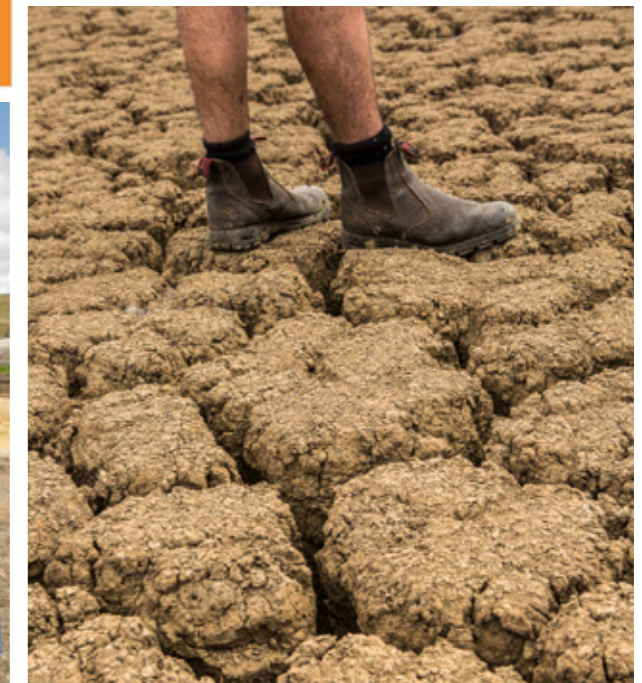

Annual Dinner 2018 Report



Australian Chinese Charity Foundation Inc. Annual Dinner was held on Saturday, 13 October 2018 at Marigold Restaurant. The Annual Dinner is one of the two major events organised by ACCF throughout the year. The main purposes of the dinner is to thank the support of our Patrons, Trustees, Members and announce the Foundation's annual distribution of grants to successful applicants.

Further, this year ACCF lent our support to local farmers via our "We Stand as One with Local Farmers – Dilly Drought Drive" fundraising appeal. The funds raised from the dinner was used to purchase animal feeds and water for the farmers within Wollondilly Shire.

The continual support to ACCF from the community was strongly demonstrated by the attendance of over 400 guests at the dinner. In total, ACCF distributed \$90,435.80 to 21 successful applicants, one of which was from Victoria, and also 5 successful applicants from our sponsorship programme in 2017. Congratulations to the successful applicants and thank you to the ACCF Funds & Grants Assessment Committee – Ms Joanna Ng, Ms Tury To, Mrs Gloria Cheung, Ms Faith Tan, Ms Cecilia Tsai and Ms Annie Tang JP, headed by the Chairman of the Funds and Grants Committee, Dr Peter Wong AM.

As a continuation of his pledge from last year, Mr Warren Lam donated another \$20,000 to ACCF. The donation is to be used for the ongoing cancer research



headed by Dr Jeremy Hensen, Head of Cancer Cell Immortality Lab, Prince of Wales Clinical School. We are grateful for Mr Lam's continual support to ACCF and cancer research.

During the Annual Dinner, three new trustees were inducted – Ms Ricki Deng, Mrs Rosanna Ng JP and Ms Terry Teng. We welcome them to our ACCF family.

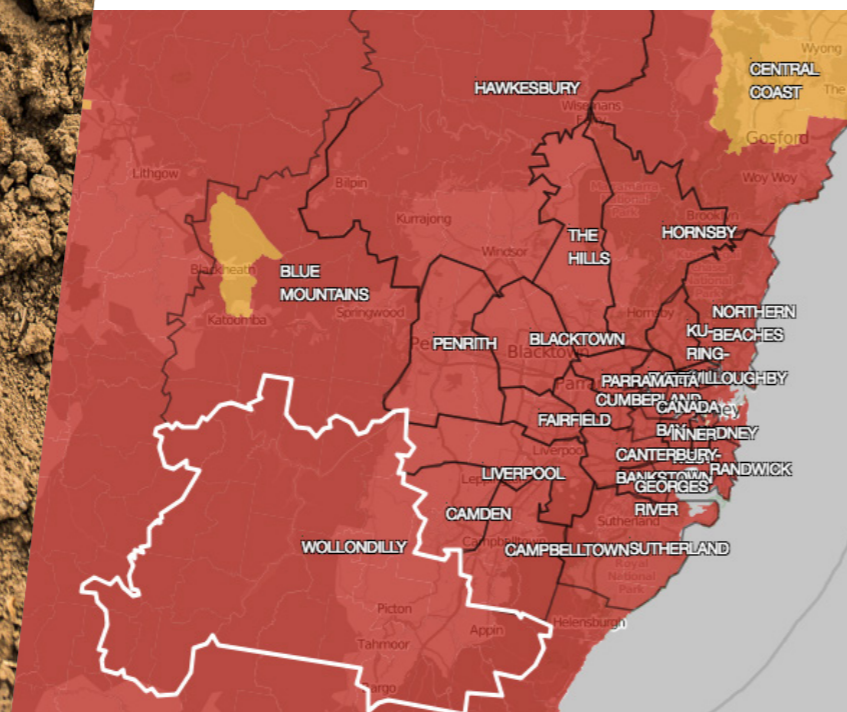
“We Stand as One with Local Farmers - Dilly Drought Drive” Fundraising Appeal

Background

The entire State of NSW was gripped in one of the worst droughts on record in 2018. To raise funds for devastated rural community to purchase animal feeds and water which are of utmost importance to the farmers, ACCF launched “We Stand as One with Local Farmers – Dilly Drought Drive” fundraising appeal in September, and Wollondilly Shire was chosen as the beneficiary of this appeal as 100% of the area was in drought.

Wollondilly Shire is located on the south-western outskirts of Sydney at the foothills of the Southern Highlands and is surrounded by spectacular natural beauty and rural pastures. It’s 2,560 square kilometres stretch from Yanderra in the South, Appin and Menangle in the East, Warragamba in the North, and the Nattai wilderness, Yerranderie and Burratorang Valley to the West. Sharon Robertson, Founder and Coordinator of the Dilly Drought Drive, shares the extraordinary community effort in the following interview.



Please tell us a bit about Dilly Drought Drive (DDD).

“I started the DDD, when a few of my friends were really struggling with the drought locally, with months I had 25 farmers locally in the Wollondilly needing help. This was in January 2018. My friends Tia and Lynette came onboard to help me out and then later Gavin to help us buy hay.”

In the first 2 weeks, I had Lions Club of Tahmoor auspice us. At present, we still have 21 farmers needing help. We are dropping over 100,000 liters of water to our farmers each week.”



What impact did ACCF’s support have in your community?

“ACCF’s help couldn’t have come at a better time, as raising money in a small community is hard enough, but coming into Christmas and school holidays we knew it would be hard. ACCF has helped us get past those season comfortably and the farmers are very appreciative of the help. Without this help, we would not have been able to set up the farmers as well as we have to get through the upcoming winter season. It has relieved a lot of pressure off the farmers. It has also made our committees workload much lighter, not having to beg for money to help the local farmers.”



In what way did ACCF’s support help you?

“The ACCF’s money bought 30 trucks up from Victoria, a total of 950 large bales, which supplied each farmer with 5-6 months’ worth of hay allocations.”

It has also helped us supply one months’ worth of water to farmers who need it, with the extra \$10,000 ACCF sent to us.”



What kind of ongoing help do you need?

“At present, we need \$8,000 a month to keep water up for the farmers. After winter we will also have to look into maybe buying more hay if we have the money to do so.”

We are hoping we will get enough rain to help grow paddocks grass, to keep everyone going, but at present the forecast is not looking good. We do not get the rain like you do in Sydney, a lot of the time it actually misses this area. We are hoping to raise another \$50,000 to get the farmers through the winter with water.”

Annual Report 2018 – 2019

The UNSW Cancer Cell Immortality Group would like to express its deep gratitude to Mr Warren Lam and his wife Mrs Daisy Lam, along with the Australian Chinese Charity Foundation Inc (ACCF), whose generous donations have enabled us to make critical progress in the fight against cancer.

Over the past 12 months, funding from these donors has allowed us to advance our work at UNSW Medicine in targeting and killing cancer cells with minimal or no side effects for the patient. By targeting a unique vulnerability in cancer cells known as the 'Immortality Mechanism', we have progressed towards clinically-tested treatment alternatives to chemotherapy.

While an effective way to kill cancer cells, chemo also harms and kills normal cells, meaning a curative dose is often not able to be administered without risking serious, permanent dysfunction of major organs. We can give more patients the chance of a cure by developing medicines that attack cancer cells with more precision, resulting in less harm to the patient.

How UNSW is pioneering new cancer treatments

Cellular immortality is a hallmark of cancer and provides a cancer-specific target for creating treatments with minimal side-effects. Unlike normal cells, cancer cells are equipped with an 'immortality mechanism', without which they are shown to die quite quickly. UNSW researchers within the Cancer Cell Immortality Group have found that by administering an immortality inhibitor, we can eradicate cancer cells without harming normal cells.

The group has developed the only specific biomarker for a specific immortality mechanism, making it possible to generate novel cancer-targeting therapeutics and diagnostics that don't harm normal cells, as well as furthering our understanding of this mechanism. We have patented a technology for measuring cancer cell immortality activity levels, which has allowed us to develop the first immortality-mechanism-targeted precision medicines.

Like many other pioneering research groups at UNSW, this work has progressed significantly this past year as a result of philanthropy. We are now undergoing trials to identify suitable patients for our precision medicines; target immortality mechanisms within cancer cells and monitor changes in patient conditions; and vigorously screen for new precision medicines that target cancer cells. We are also investigating a mechanism that is not visible, even with the use of a microscope, so we are also working to develop a way to visualise and measure this to ensure our research can progress.

UNSW is very grateful to Mr and Mrs Lam and the ACCF for their continued support of our work spearheading innovative and non-invasive strategies for curing cancer. As cancer is now the leading cause of death in Australia and China, among many other nations, the ground-breaking research of our Cancer Cell Immortality Group embodies UNSW's values around innovations and collaboration, and reaffirms our University's key role in tackling global grand challenges. Going ahead, it is our hope to secure ongoing funding to support our goals, and grow our team of research professionals dedicated to this area, so that we may move our group project to completion.

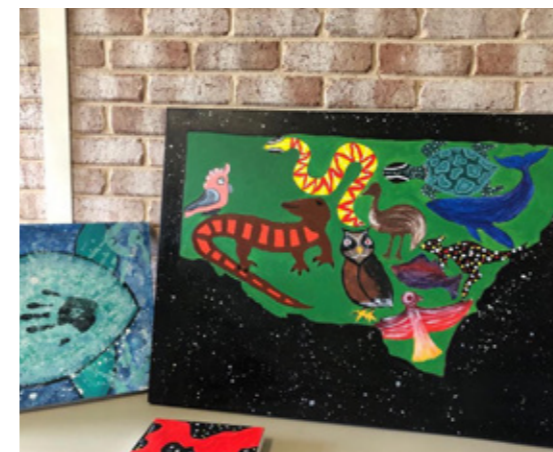

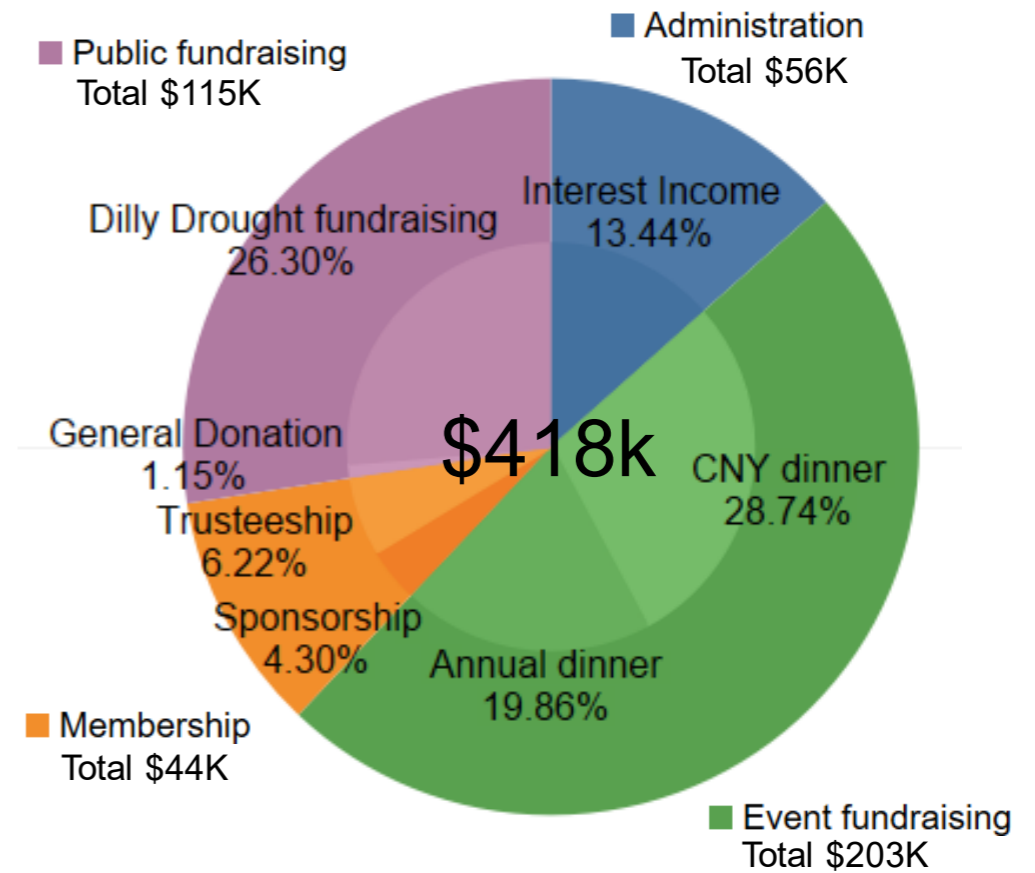

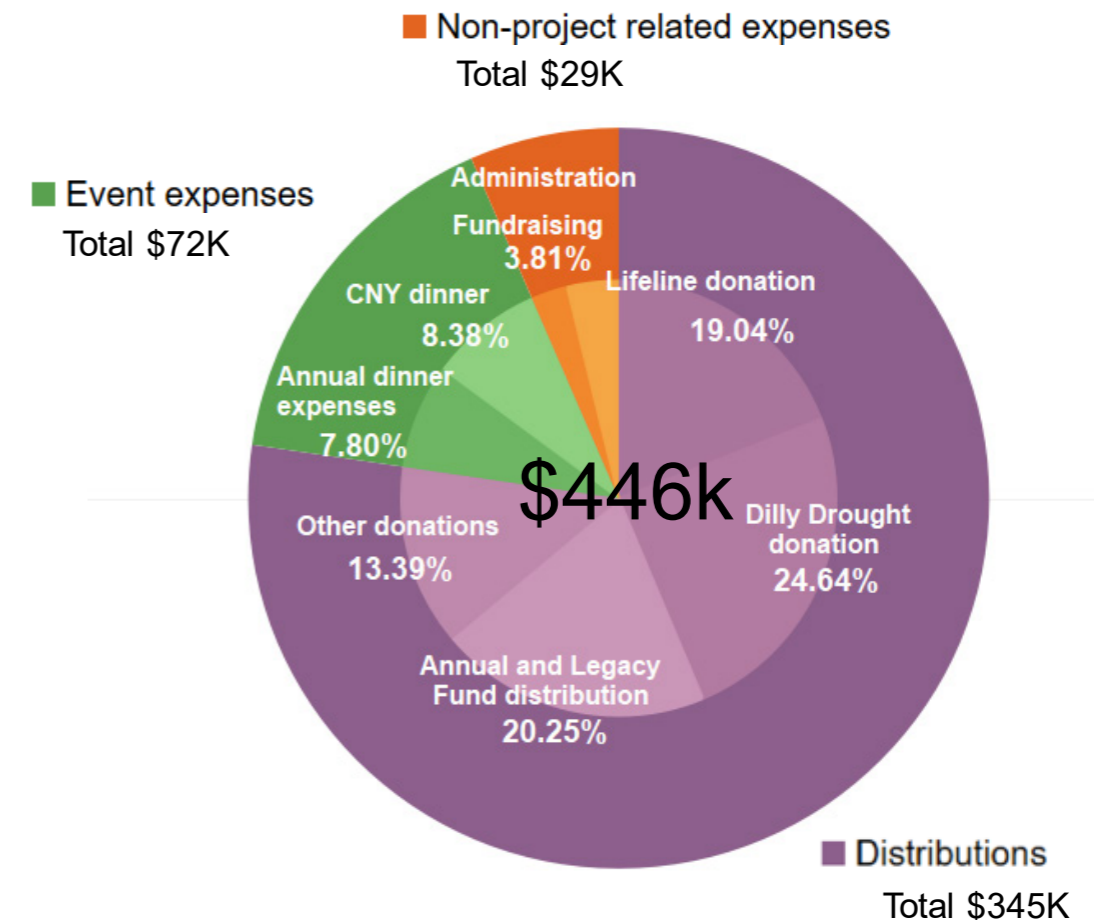

Principal activities

The principal activities of the Foundation during the financial year were to raise funds to support beneficial community projects, respond to the urgent need of those in a state of emergency and to promote multiculturalism in our society.

Review of operations

The deficit for the year amounted to \$28,207 (2017: surplus of \$14,187).

There were no significant changes in the Foundation's state of affairs during the financial year.

The Foundation has not, during or since the end of the financial year, except to the extent permitted by law, indemnified or agreed to indemnify an officer or auditor of the Foundation or of any related body corporate against a liability incurred as such an officer or auditor.

Subsequent events

There has not been any matter or circumstance occurring subsequent to the end of the financial year that has significantly affected, or may significantly affect, the operations of the Foundation, the results of those operations, or the state of affairs of the Foundation in future financial years.

Proceedings on behalf of the Foundation

No person has applied to the Court under section 237 of the *Corporations Act 2001* for leave to bring proceedings on behalf of the Foundation, or to intervene in any proceedings to which the Foundation is a party, for the purpose of taking responsibility on behalf of the Foundation for all or part of those proceedings.

Legacy fund

The legacy fund was launched in June 2018. In light of the low interest rate in the market and an increased demand by community charitable organisations to obtain funding to carry out services to help the Australian community, the legacy fund enabled the foundation to have increased funds available for distribution to approved projects and sponsorships. The legacy fund will allow donors to donate a minimum of \$250,000 with the ability to name the charitable cause that they would like it to go towards. The donation is to be made to the Foundation within three years. As at 31 December 2018, \$550,000 was being held on behalf of donors who would like to donate to the legacy fund initiative.

Auditor

PricewaterhouseCoopers continues in office in accordance with section 327 of the *Corporations Act 2001*.

1 Summary of significant accounting policies

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial report are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

(a) Basis of preparation

(i) Special purpose financial report

The management committee has determined that the Australian Chinese Charity Foundation Inc. ("the Foundation") is not a reporting entity because there are no users dependent on general purpose financial reports.

This is a special purpose financial report that has been prepared for the sole purpose of complying with the *Associations Incorporation Act 1984 and Australian Charities and Not-for-Profit Commission (ACNC) Act 2012* requirements to prepare and distribute a financial report to the members and must not be used for any other purpose. The management committee has determined that the accounting policies adopted are appropriate to meet the needs of the members.

The financial report has been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the *Associations Incorporation Act 1984 and Australian Charities and Not-for-Profit Commission (ACNC) Act 2012*, the recognition and measurement requirements specified by all Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations, and the disclosure requirements of Accounting Standards AASB 101 *Presentation of Financial Statements*, AASB 107 *Statement of Cash Flows*, AASB 108 *Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors*, and AASB 1054 *Australian Additional Disclosures*.

Australian Chinese Charity Foundation Inc. is a not-for-profit entity for the purpose of preparing the financial report.

(ii) Historical cost convention

The financial report is prepared in accordance with the historical cost convention and does not take into account changing money values or, except where specifically stated, current valuations of non-current assets. The accounting policies adopted are consistent with those of the previous year.

(iii) Functional and presentation currency

Items included in the financial statements are measured using the currency of the primary economic environment in which the Foundation operates ('the functional currency'). The financial statements are presented in Australian dollars, which is the Foundation's functional and presentation currency.

(b) Revenue recognition

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable.

The Foundation recognises revenue when the amount of revenue can be reliably measured, it is probable that future economic benefits will flow to the entity and specific criteria have been met for each of the Foundation's activities as described below.

(i) Activity income

Activity income relates to money received from the sale of tickets to dinners, auction items and raffle tickets. Activity income is recognised when cash is received or when the Foundation obtains the right to receive cash.

(ii) Trusteeship income

Trusteeship income is donations from trustees to the entity. Trusteeship income is recognised when received or when the Foundation obtains the right to receive the contribution.

(iii) Donations

Donations represent monies received into the Foundation's bank accounts. Common with most organisations dependent on such contributions, the Foundation is unable to establish control over voluntary donations prior to their initial entry into the accounting records. As such, donation income is recognised when received or when the Foundation obtains the right to receive the contribution, it is probable that the economic benefits comprising the contribution will flow to the entity and the amount of the contribution can be measured reliably.

1 Summary of significant accounting policies (continued)

(b) Revenue recognition (continued)

(iv) Interest income

Interest income is recognised using the effective interest method.

(v) Donations in kind

Donations in kind are not brought to account as revenue.

(vi) Patron Income

Patron income is donations from patrons to the entity. Patron income is recognised when received or when the Foundation obtains the right to receive the contribution.

(vii) Legacy Fund revenue

The legacy fund was launched in June 2018. The legacy fund allows members and other contributors to donate to the Foundation. The donors are then able to dictate the purpose for which the donation will be used. As such the Foundation has treated the legacy donations as restricted cash with a corresponding liability which represents deferral of the revenue. Revenue is recognised when the funds are paid to the cause that has been nominated. Interest earned on the principal amounts of the legacy funds is available for the Foundation to use for donations.

(c) Income tax

The Foundation is exempt from Income tax in accordance with Div 50 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1997*. Under this division, the Foundation is classified as a non-profit organisation.

(d) Cash and cash equivalents

For the purpose of presentation in the statement of cash flows; cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with financial institutions, other short-term, highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

(e) Receivables

The recoverability of receivables is assessed at year end and specific provision is made for any doubtful accounts. The carrying amount of receivables approximates net fair value.

(f) Payables

Liabilities are recognised for amounts to be paid in future for goods and services received. The carrying amount of payables approximates net fair value.

(g) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

The Foundation has elected to treat the 2019 and 2018 Dinner Activities as input taxed fundraising events in accordance with subdivision 40 F of A New Tax System (Goods and Services Tax) Act 1999.

(h) Forthcoming requirements

As at 30 September 2018, the following standards and interpretations had been issued but were not mandatory for annual reporting periods ending 31 December 2018.

Our qualified opinion

In our opinion, except for the possible effects of the matter described in the *Basis for qualified opinion* section of our report, the accompanying financial report of Australian Chinese Charity Foundation Inc. (the Foundation) is in accordance with Division 60 of the *Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission (ACNC) Act 2012*, including:

- (a) giving a true and fair view of the Foundation's financial position as at 31 December 2018 and of its financial performance for the year then ended
- (b) complying with Australian Accounting Standards to the extent described in Note 1 and Division 60 of the *Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Regulation 2013*.

What we have audited

The financial report comprises:

Cash from donations and other fundraising activities are a significant source of revenue for the Foundation. The Management Committee have determined that it is impracticable to establish control over the collection of revenue from these sources prior to entry into its financial records. Accordingly, as the evidence available to us regarding revenue from cash donations and other fundraising activities was limited, our audit procedures with respect to revenue from these sources had to be restricted to the amounts recorded in the Foundation's financial records. As a result, we are unable to express an opinion as to whether revenue from cash donations and other fundraising activities is complete.

We conducted our audit in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the financial report* section of our report.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our qualified opinion.

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Independence

We are independent of the Foundation in accordance with the ethical requirements of the Accounting Professional and Ethical Standards Board's APES 110 *Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants* (the Code) that are relevant to our audit of the financial report in Australia. We have also fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the Code.

Emphasis of matter - basis of accounting and restriction on use

We draw attention to Note 1 in the financial report, which describes the basis of accounting. The financial report has been prepared for the purpose of fulfilling the Management Committee's financial reporting responsibilities under the *Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission (ACNC) Act 2012*. As a result, the financial report may not be suitable for another purpose. Our report is intended solely for Australian Chinese Charity Foundation Inc. and its members and should not be used by parties other than Australian Chinese Charity Foundation Inc. and its members. Our opinion is not modified in respect of this matter.

Other information

The Management Committee is responsible for the other information. The other information comprises the information included in the Management Committee's Report for the year ended 31 December 2018, but does not include the financial report and our auditor's report thereon.

Our opinion on the financial report does not cover the other information and accordingly we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with our audit of the financial report, our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial report or our knowledge obtained in the audit, or otherwise appears to be materially misstated.

If, based on the work we have performed on the other information that we obtained prior to the date of this auditor's report, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, we are required to report that fact. We have nothing to report in this regard.


