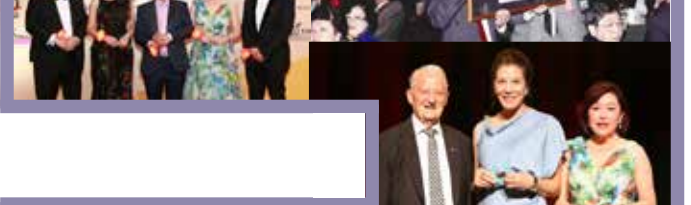

Chairman's Message

A significant highlight of the year was the celebration of our 35th Anniversary through a successful Charity Gala Dinner held on 25 October 2025 at the Fullerton Hotel Sydney. This milestone event brought together members, community leaders, partners, sponsors, and supporters to honour more than three decades of charitable service and community contribution. It also provided an opportunity to recognise the vision of

our Founding Chairman, Dr Peter Wong AM, together with our founding members, past chairmen, patrons, trustees, members, and volunteers whose dedication laid the foundation for the organisation we proudly serve today.

Importantly, we achieved a substantial increase in our annual community project grant distributions, reflecting both the growing needs within the community and our unwavering commitment to supporting those facing hardship. I am proud to share that a total of \$150,000 in community grants was distributed to 23 deserving recipients, enabling important programs and support services to continue making a positive impact across the wider community.

As part of our anniversary celebrations, we were also proud to nominate the ANZAC Research Institute as the special beneficiary of the Charity Gala Dinner, reaffirming our commitment to supporting important community and medical research initiatives beyond our regular funding programs.

Another memorable occasion was the successful hosting of our 2026 Chinese New Year Dinner, which brought together community leaders, supporters, and members in a spirit of celebration, harmony, and cultural pride. This event also marked an important milestone for the Foundation with the official registration of the ACCF trademark. This achievement strengthens our organisational identity, enhances public confidence, and reinforces our commitment to building a respected and enduring charitable foundation for future generations.

During the Chinese New Year celebrations, we were reminded that while this festive season is a time of joy and unity, it is equally important to extend compassion to those facing hardship. In response to the recent bushfire disaster in Victoria, ACCF proudly nominated

The Salvation Army as the beneficiary of our Chinese New Year fundraising initiative to support bushfire victims and affected families. Through this contribution, we hope to assist relief and recovery efforts, helping communities rebuild their lives and restore hope during difficult times.

In response to ongoing economic pressures, the Management Committee also expanded our emergency relief funding to provide timely support for individuals and families experiencing financial hardship, ensuring that our Foundation continues to deliver meaningful and compassionate assistance where it is needed most.

I would like to express my heartfelt appreciation to every individual and organisation that has contributed throughout the year. 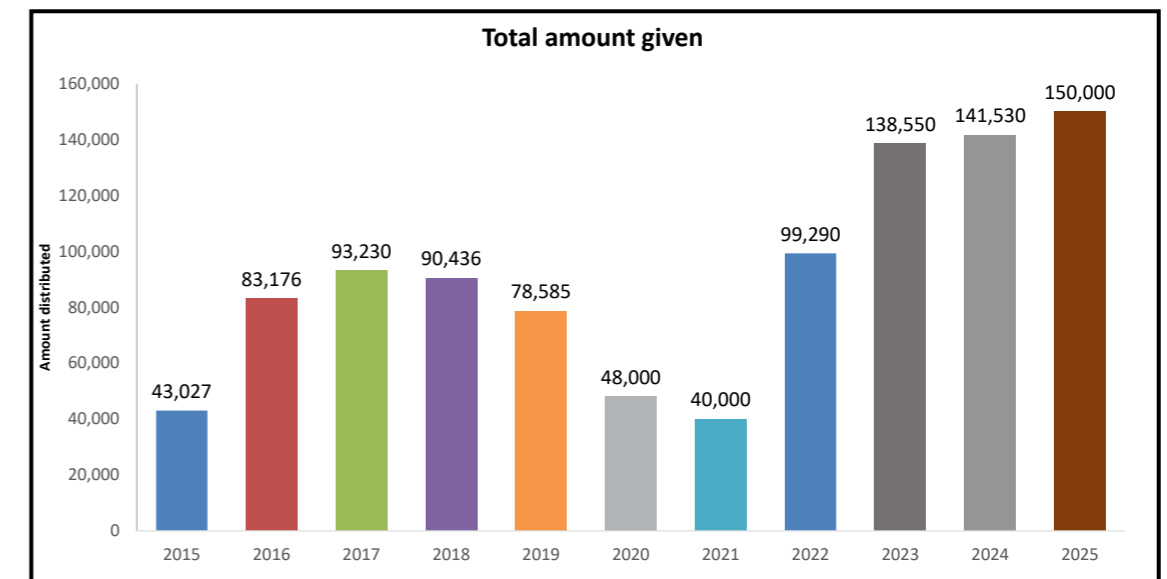
Our People 我們的成員

- Provide funding for individuals with emergency needs arising from unforeseen or unexpected circumstances via our Emergency Assistance Funding Programme;
- Generate lasting funds for those who are in need in our community through the Legacy Fund Programme;
- Disaster response to national and international disasters – Examples include: “We Stand as One with Local Farmers - Dilly Drought Drive” (2018/19), ACCF Bushfire Emergency Relief Appeal (2019/20), Hubei Appeal - Fight Against Coronavirus (2020) and “ACCF Flood Relief Appeal – Here4You” (2022);
- To promote and raise awareness of the cultural diversity in the community – Example: ACCF Migrant Women's Conference (2019).

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Annual Dinner 2025 Report

It is my great honour and privilege to be appointed to chair ACCF 35th Anniversary Gala Dinner on 25th October 2025 at the Fullerton Hotel Sydney which is a milestone; and also it is one of the important events in the ACCF calendar to celebrate our 35th Anniversary and achievements in the past years.

The Gala Dinner was well attended with over 300 guests, members and community friends. The Foundation was very honoured to have the presence of a number of dignitaries:

- Ms Sally Sitou MP, Member for Reid, representing The Hon. Anthony Albanese MP, Prime Minister of Australia

This year, our beneficiary is “Medical Research Project - ANZAC Research Institute, Sydney Local Health District”.

Each year in Australia, over 57,000 heart attacks and 27,000 strokes occur, costing the healthcare system \$12.7 billion, with an additional \$26 billion lost to premature death

and reduced wellbeing:

- A stroke or heart attack can be life-changing—not only for the individual, but for their family—leading to long-term disability, emotional distress, and loss of independence.
- For the community, these events drive billions in healthcare costs, lost productivity, and strain on health care including aged care and support services.

The Platelet and Thrombosis Research Lab at the ANZAC Research Institute has developed a novel blood test that predicts which patients are at high risk of developing dangerous blood clots—we hope this can enable future personalised treatment to prevent heart attack and stroke. A positive test result guides clinicians to escalate therapy and reduce recurrence, while a negative test helps avoid unnecessary treatment and its side effects.

Originally developed for patients with chronic blood cancers, who are at particularly high risk of clotting, this test shows promise for broader use across cardiovascular care. With the support of ACCF and the Hudson Chen Memorial Fund, they aim to validate and implement this test across clinical settings, helping prevent thousands of heart attacks and strokes every year —transforming prevention and saving lives.

As a medical research, they rely significantly upon the generosity of the community and corporate Australia to support their life changing programs. With everyone’s great support and generosity on the evening, together with the Hudson Chen Memorial Fund, we have successfully raised and donated \$40,000 to them. It definitely makes all the difference!

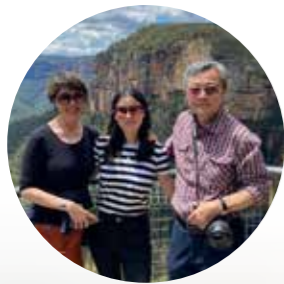

Community Support Foundation

Caring for Seniors with Dementia will use cultural performance and expert education to raise awareness and support for dementia care. The musical drama Memory Shines, Love Remains and a seminar by Professor Garry Walters help the community understand early recognition, treatment, and caregiving. The project aims to reduce stigma, encourage early action, and strengthen support for seniors and their families.



The Mito Foundation created a Clinical Trials Knowledge Base (CTKB), a free online platform that provides clear, accessible information on Mito-related clinical trials for Australians. By centralising global trial data and translating complex details into plain language summaries, the CTKB will reduce confusion, support informed decision making, and improve access to emerging therapies. It will also give clinicians a reliable resource to share with families, helping ensure Australians are not left behind in accessing potentially life changing treatments.



Faith Family Fund

(For Emergency Needs)



The Faith Family Fund is a legacy initiative focused on providing emergency support to individuals facing unexpected hardship. Drawing on lived experience as an immigrant, the fund aims to assist those in crisis, including situations involving medical needs, natural disasters, and financial instability.

The Emergency Assistance Fund provides vital support to individuals and families facing urgent needs caused by unforeseen or unexpected circumstances that result in financial or personal hardship. Through this fund, ACCF has been able to assist community members with re-establishment costs, medical treatment and medication, rent, and essential daily living expenses. This year, there has been a significant increase in the number of people seeking emergency assistance, reflecting the growing demand for immediate support during times of crisis.

ACCF Raises \$20,000 to Support Victorian Bushfire Recovery Efforts

At the Australian Chinese Charity Foundation Inc (ACCF) Celebration Dinner, held in celebration of the Year of the Horse and attended by more than 300 guests, ACCF raised \$20,000 to support communities affected by the devastating Victorian bushfires.

While the evening marked an important cultural celebration for the Chinese Australian community, the unfolding bushfire crisis in Victoria had deeply concerned many attendees. In response, ACCF dedicated part of the event to fundraising, reflecting a strong sense of responsibility and solidarity with those impacted.

The funds were presented to representatives from The Salvation Army NSW in support of The Salvation Army's Victorian Bushfire Appeal, which has been providing emergency relief and recovery assistance to affected communities.

Throughout the bushfire emergency, The Salvation Army has been at the forefront of providing assistance to evacuees and local communities through relief services, community assistance programs, deploying and frontline responders across fire-affected areas in Victoria.

The contribution from ACCF forms part of a broader community effort to support individuals, families and regions impacted by the bushfires, while also assisting longer-term recovery and rebuilding initiatives.

The initiative reflects ACCF's ongoing commitment to contributing to the wider Australian community and demonstrates the generosity and unity of the Chinese Australian community during times of national crisis.



Breakthrough Blood Test to Prevent Heart Attack and Stroke

Medical Research Project – ANZAC Research Institute, Sydney Local Health District

With the support of ACCF and the Hudson Chen Memorial Fund, Professor Chen's Research Group at the ANZAC Research Institute continues to advance its research into a new blood test that can help identify people at risk of dangerous blood clots that cause heart attack and stroke. By understanding risk more accurately, this work has the potential to guide the start of preventive therapy before serious illness occurs.

What makes this work unique is that the same test is being used to better understand why clots form, so that new drugs can be designed. Using deep sequencing methods to study blood donated by patients, the team is taking a close look at what is happening inside cells to reveal changes that were previously hidden. Importantly, this work has already led to early discoveries that could one day support the development of new drugs that reduce stroke risk while preserving normal blood function. The research is contributing to the longer-term goal of therapies that are more precise, effective, and have fewer side effects.

Patient and community voices have played an important role in shaping this research, ensuring that the project focuses on outcomes that matter most. At the heart of the project is the goal of personalised medicine – care that is guided by an individual's biology, rather than a one-size-fits-all approach.

As one patient shared when reflecting on the potential of this work:

"What gives me hope is knowing this research looks at my own biology. A test like this could one day show my personal risk and how I respond to treatment, helping doctors tailor care to me rather than relying on general rules."

Why this matters

1. **More personalised care:** Care could be tailored to real risk, rather than a one-size-fits-all approach.
2. **Innovation beyond prediction:** The test helps researchers understand disease biology, opening doors to new treatments.
3. **Community impact:** Prevention reduces the long-term burden on families, carers, and the health system.

By investing in research that focuses on prevention, understanding, as well as new therapies, ACCF is supporting the translation of scientific discovery into future clinical impact, helping pave the way toward better treatments for the community.

Interview with Next Sense



Project: *Harmonising Futures: Early Intervention Music Therapy for Children with Hearing or Vision Loss.*

Please describe your project and what areas or populations that it aims to support
Australian Chinese Charity Foundation is supporting our project, *Harmonising Futures: Early Intervention Music Therapy for Children with Hearing or Vision Loss*. This inclusive, evidence-based program is delivered through our centre in Macquarie Park and supports children aged one to six who are deaf or hard of hearing, blind, or have low vision, along with their families. Through music-based activities, the program helps children strengthen communication, listening, movement, and social skills, while also fostering emotional connection between children and their families. Parents participate in each session, learning practical strategies they can continue at home to support their child's development.

How is the project progressing?

The project is progressing well, with strong engagement from families and clinicians. Music therapy sessions are being delivered as part of children's early intervention programs, with consistent attendance and participation. We are on track to support at least 28 children over the year through the music therapy program, and families have embraced the opportunity to be actively involved in their child's learning.

What changes have you seen in individuals or your community as a result of your project?

We are already seeing meaningful outcomes for both children and their families. Children participating in the music therapy sessions are building confidence and demonstrating growth in communication, social interaction, and early learning skills. The use of music creates an engaging and accessible pathway for development, particularly for children with sensory impairments. Families report feeling more confident and empowered, with practical tools they can use at home to support their child's progress. Just as importantly, the program is fostering a sense of connection and belonging among families who can often feel isolated.

At a service level, enhancements to our assessment capabilities are ensuring more accurate diagnoses, giving families greater clarity and confidence in their child's developmental pathway.

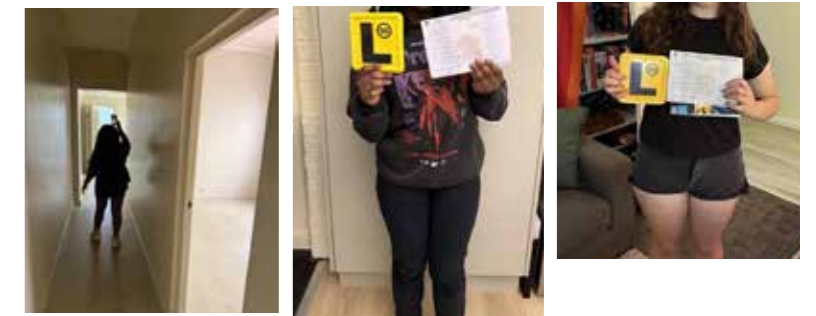
What did receiving this grant mean for your organisation and the community?

Receiving this grant has been incredibly meaningful for both NextSense and the families we support. For our organisation, it has enabled us to deliver an innovative, high-quality early intervention program that may not otherwise have been possible, while also strengthening critical diagnostic services.

For the community, it has reduced barriers to accessing specialised support, ensuring families can receive the care they need close to home. The program is not only supporting children's development but also empowering parents and creating a more inclusive, connected community for families of children with hearing or vision loss.

We are sincerely grateful to the Australian Chinese Charity Foundation for making this work possible.

Interview with St Laurence House



Project: *The Compass Project*

Please describe your project and what areas or populations that it aims to support
Our project "The Compass Project" supports young people experiencing homelessness to be provided with flexible, goal-based support tailored to their individual needs.

How is the project progressing?

The project has allowed for young people to have their needs met in ways they may have thought was not possible. This has allowed staff to explore new and exciting ways to support the needs of the young people within St Laurence House.

What changes have you seen in individuals or your community as a result of your project?

Since the implementation of the project, the young people supported have been able to access life changing resources that they previously had no other way to access. This has included mental health assessments, allowing young people to apply for the necessary supports they need through the NDIS after confirmation of diagnosis. This has seen a positive change in the overall wellbeing of clients through further understanding of themselves and their needs.

Other young people have been able to access professional driving lessons, supporting them in developing their independence and confidence as a young person. The young people we support often do not have access to an adult that is able to teach them how to drive, so professional lessons are crucial for this milestone.

One young person was able to access financial support to become established in their first property after moving out of our refuge. Access to support for their first grocery shop and essential goods to make their property a home. This support allowed the young person to continue in their independence while focusing on their education; not having to increase their employment hours to make up for the significant financial cost of moving house.

What did receiving this grant mean for your organisation and the community?

By receiving this grant, St Laurence House has been able to provide the best support possible to the young people within our services. The possibilities from this grant mean that young people experiencing homelessness have the resources necessary to thrive in their personal goals, whether that be education, employment, living skills or overall wellbeing.

Interview with Gabriel Lee



1. How long have you been a YACCF member?

I joined YACCF in October 2025, so it has now been about half a year. Although I have not been with the team for a very long time, this short period has already been deeply meaningful and rewarding for me.

2. What have been some of the highlights since joining YACCF?

One of the biggest highlights has been serving in two major fundraising events: the ACCF Annual Dinner and the ACCF 2026 Chinese New Year Celebration Dinner. These experiences allowed me to witness how much collective goodwill can be generated when people come together for a shared purpose. It was especially meaningful to know that the funds raised could support people in real need, including those affected by the recent bushfires in Victoria.

Another highlight has been the friendships I have built with fellow volunteers. Volunteering is not only about giving time and effort; it is also about meeting people with generous hearts and a strong sense of compassion. Serving alongside such people is both uplifting and energising. Their example has encouraged me and reminded me that charity is not only something we do, but also something we live out together.

3. What inspires you to volunteer with YACCF?

Volunteering with YACCF resonates strongly with both my personal values and my faith. I have always had a desire to walk alongside people and support those in need. This was one of the reasons I left my research role in Hong Kong and came to Australia to study social work.

Through YACCF, I have had the chance to experience both sides — serving directly, while also contributing to the support behind the scenes. That has made my journey feel more complete, more grounded, and ultimately more fulfilling. It has shown me that meaningful service requires both frontline action and the collective effort that sustains it.

I enjoy helping people and knowing excellent people. I feel like finding my destiny group and my mission apart from normal life. There is a lot to learn and experience.

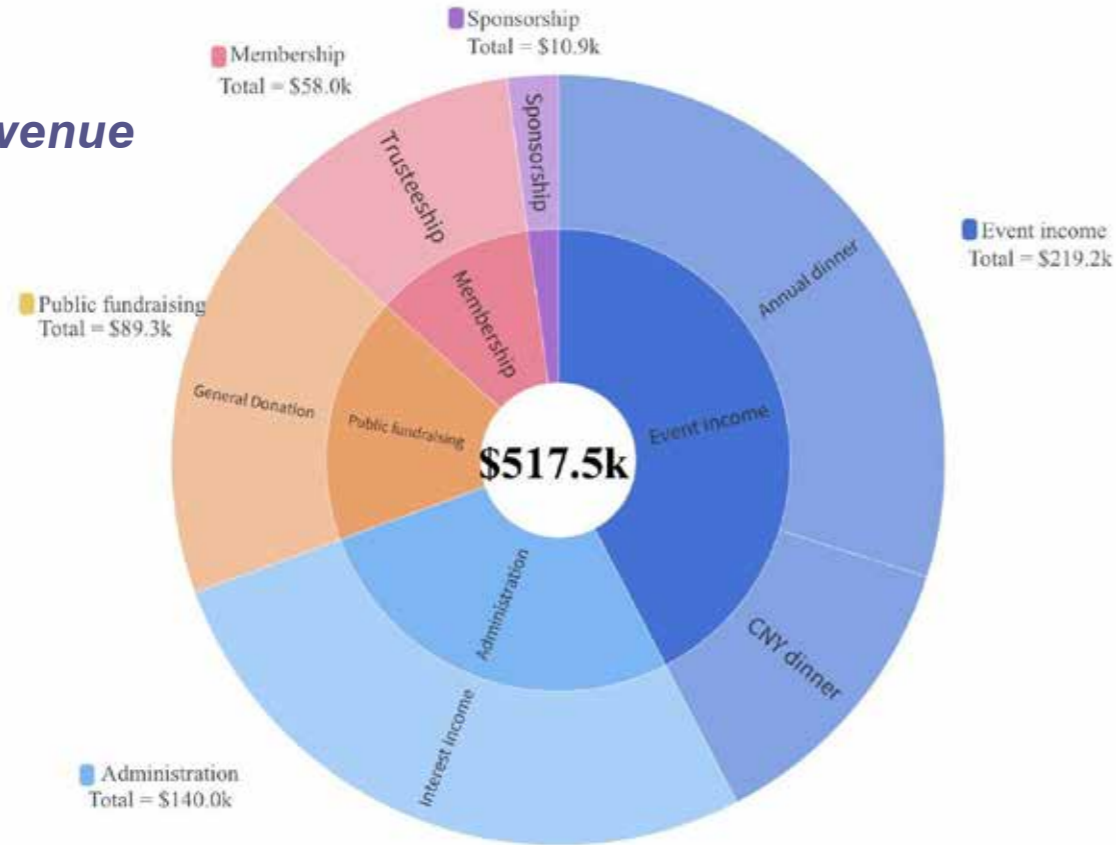
3. What inspires you to volunteer with YACCF? And how do you value your journey so far?

Revenue



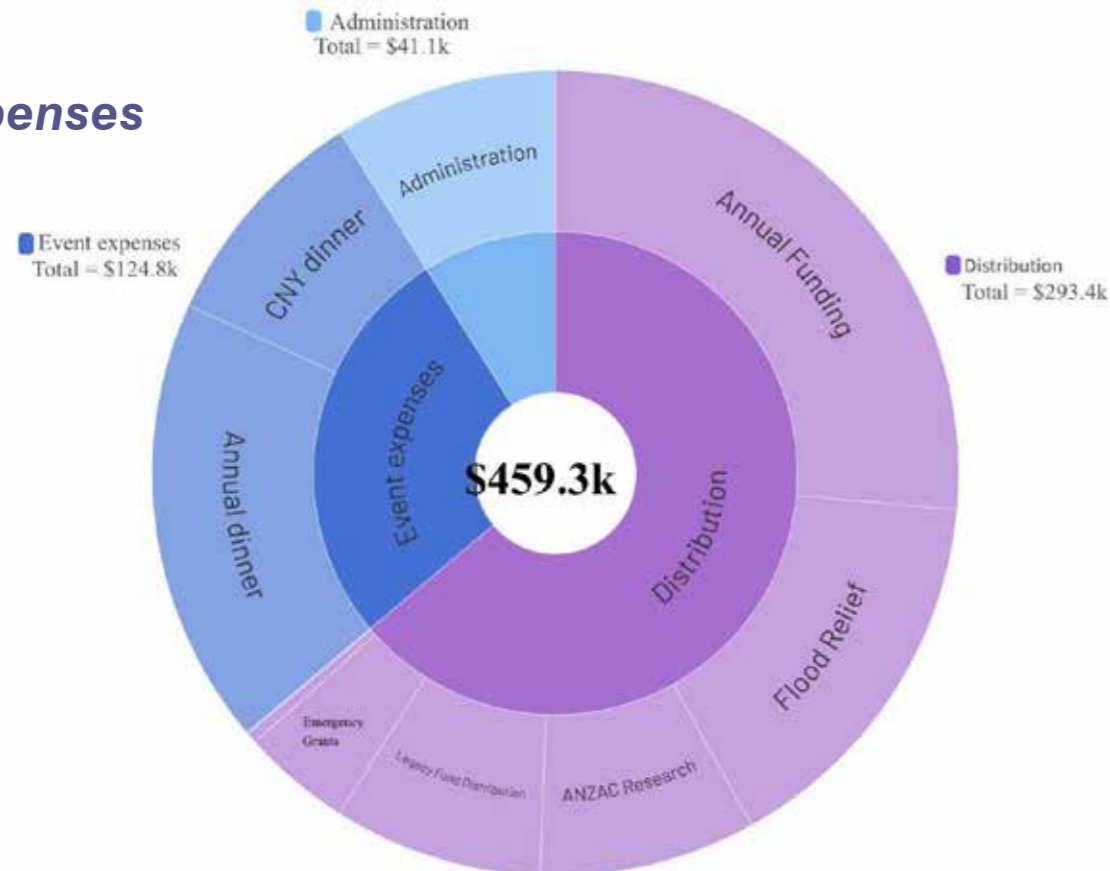

The principal activities of the Foundation during the financial year were to raise funds to support beneficial community projects, respond to the urgent need of those in a state of emergency and to promote multiculturalism in our society.

Review of operations

The surplus for the year amounted to \$58,144 (2024: surplus of \$17,085).

Significant changes in the state of affairs

There are no significant changes in the state of affairs during the year.

Indemnification of officers and auditors

The Foundation has not, during or since the end of the financial year, except to the extent permitted by law, indemnified or agreed to indemnify an officer or auditor of the Foundation or of any related body corporate against a liability incurred as such an officer or auditor.

Events since the end of the financial year

No matter or circumstance has arisen since 31 December 2025 that has significantly affected the Foundation's operations, results or state of affairs, or may do so in the future.

Proceedings on behalf of the Foundation

No person has applied to the Court under section 237 of the *Corporations Act 2001* for leave to bring proceedings on behalf of the Foundation, or to intervene in any proceedings to which the Foundation is a party, for the purpose of taking responsibility on behalf of the Foundation for all or part of those proceedings.



Notes to the Financial Statements
For the Year Ended 31 December 2025

The financial report covers Australian Chinese Charity Foundation Incorporation as an individual entity. Australian Chinese Charity Foundation Incorporation is a not-for-profit Foundation, registered and domiciled in Australia.

The principal activities of the Foundation for the year ended 31 December 2025 were to raise funds to support beneficial community projects, respond to the urgent need of those in a state of emergency and to promote multiculturalism in our society.

The functional and presentation currency of Australian Chinese Charity Foundation Incorporation is Australian dollars.

The financial report was authorised for issue by the Management Committee on .

Comparatives are consistent with prior years, unless otherwise stated.

1 Basis of Preparation

The financial statements are general purpose financial statements that have been prepared in accordance with the Australian Accounting Standards - Simplified Disclosures and the *Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012*.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities.

Material accounting policy information relating to the preparation of these financial statements are presented below, and are consistent with prior reporting periods unless otherwise stated.

2 Material Accounting Policy Information

(a) Revenue and other income

Revenue from contracts with customers

Revenue is recognised on a basis that reflects the transfer of control of promised goods or services to customers at an amount that reflects the consideration the Foundation expects to receive in exchange for those goods or services.

Generally the timing of the payment for sale of goods and rendering of services corresponds closely to the timing of satisfaction of the performance obligations, however where there is a difference, it will result in the recognition of a receivable, contract asset or contract liability.

None of the revenue streams of the Foundation have any significant financing terms as there is less than 12 months between receipt of funds and satisfaction of performance obligations.

Revenue recognition policy for contracts which are either not enforceable or do not have sufficiently specific performance obligations

The revenue recognition policies for the principal revenue streams of the Foundation are:

Ticket sales revenue

The Foundation sells tickets to members and the public for their annual dinner and Chinese New Year dinner. Upon the sale of the tickets, the Foundation has an obligation to provide dinner on the specified dinner date. Revenue is recognised at a point in time once the dinner occurs.

2 Material Accounting Policy Information

(a) Revenue and other income

Revenue recognition policy for contracts which are either not enforceable or do not have sufficiently specific performance obligations

Raffle and auction revenue

At the dinner events, the Foundation holds a raffle with multiple prizes up for the win. In order to be able to participate in the raffle, invitees present at the dinner have the ability to purchase raffle tickets which will allow them to participate in the raffle draw. The Foundation's performance obligation is fulfilled at the time of the draw as each raffle ticket holder is able to participate in the raffle and claim the prize if they have the winning number. The revenue from the sales of raffle tickets is recognised at a point in time once the dinner occurs.

Similarly, at the dinner events, the Foundation may hold an auction, where the highest bidder will win various prizes. The revenue from the sale of auction items is recognised when the dinner occurs.

Donations income

Donations represent monies received into the Foundation's bank accounts. Common with most organisations dependent on such contributions, the Foundation is unable to establish control over voluntary donations prior to their initial entry into the accounting records. As such, unless specific performance obligations exist, donation income is recognised when received or when the Foundation obtains the right to receive the contribution, it is probable that the economic benefits comprising the contribution will flow to the entity and the amount of the contribution can be measured reliably. When specific performance obligations exist, donation income is recognised as the obligations under the contract are satisfied.

Membership income

The Foundation has four levels of memberships from which it receives income. The monies received for the membership are recognised accordingly upon receipt.

Sponsorship income

The Foundation receives income from sponsors in order to enable the Foundation to further its objective. The income is recognised in the profit and loss for the period it relates to.

Legacy Fund

The legacy fund was officially launched in June 2018. The legacy fund allows members and other contributors to donate to the Foundation. Under the deed signed for the legacy fund, donors have the ability to propose the cause to which donations should be made. Although the promise to provide donations to a cause proposed by the donor is a promise to transfer goods or services, it is not a sufficiently specific performance obligation. While the promise to provide donations is distinct and the Foundation can identify at the end of the year whether or not it has donated to the cause proposed, it cannot identify when its obligation is fully satisfied and cannot allocate the transaction price as the promise is continuous as long as ACCF exists. ACCF must be able to identify when the performance obligation is satisfied for the promise to be identified as sufficiently specific. Accordingly, the Foundation recognises the donations as income when it gains control of the donated cash.

2 Material Accounting Policy Information

(a) Revenue and other income

Statement of financial position balances relating to revenue recognition

Other income

Other income is recognised on an accruals basis when the Foundation is entitled to it.

Finance income

Interest income is calculated by applying the effective interest rate to the gross carrying amount of a financial asset except for financial assets that subsequently become credit impaired.

Interest income is presented as finance income where it is earned from financial assets that are held for cash management purposes.

Donations in kind

Donations in kind are not brought to account as revenue.

Grant income

Revenue in the scope of AASB 1058 is recognised on receipt unless it relates to a capital grant which satisfies certain criteria, in this case the grant is recognised as the asset is acquired or constructed.

(b) Income tax

The Foundation is exempt from income tax under Division 50 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1997*.

(c) Goods and services tax (GST)

Receivables and payable are stated inclusive of GST.

Cash flows in the statement of cash flows are included on a gross basis and the GST component of cash flows arising from investing and financing activities which is recoverable from, or payable to, the taxation authority is classified as operating cash flows.

(d) Volunteer services

No amounts are included in the financial statements for services donated by volunteers. The Foundation did not elect to disclose volunteer services.

3 Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgments

The Management Committee make estimates and judgements during the preparation of these financial statements regarding assumptions about current and future events affecting transactions and balances.

These estimates and judgements are based on the best information available at the time of preparing the financial statements, however as additional information is known then the actual results may differ from the estimates.

3 Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgments

The significant estimates and judgements made have been described below.

Key estimates - receivables

The receivables at reporting date have been reviewed to determine whether there is any objective evidence that any of the receivables are impaired. An impairment provision is included for any receivable where the entire balance is not considered collectible. The impairment provision is based on the best information at the reporting date.

Report on the Audit of the Financial Report

Qualified Opinion

We have audited the financial report of Australian Chinese Charity Foundation Incorporation (the Foundation), which comprise the statement of financial position as at 31 December 2025, and the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income, statement of changes in equity and the statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of material accounting policies and the management committee's declaration.

In our opinion, except for the effects of the matter described in the *Basis for Qualified Opinion* section of our report, the financial report of the Foundation is in accordance with Division 60 of the *Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission Act 2012* (ACNC Act) including:

- i. giving a true and fair view of the Foundation's financial position as at 31 December 2025 and of its performance for the year then ended; and
- ii. complying with Australian Accounting Standards, General Purpose – Simplified Disclosure, and Division 60 of the *Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission Regulation 2022*.

Basis for Qualified Opinion

Cash from donations and other fundraising activities are a significant source of revenue for the Foundation. The Management Committee have determined that it is impracticable to establish control over the collection of revenue from these sources prior to entry into its financial records. Accordingly, as the evidence available to us regarding revenue from cash donations and other fundraising activities was limited, our audit procedures with respect to revenue from these sources had to be restricted to the amounts recorded in the Foundation's financial records. As a result, we are unable to express an opinion as to whether revenue from cash donations and other fundraising activities is complete.

We conducted our audit in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Report* section of our report. We are independent of the Foundation in accordance with the auditor independence requirements of ACNC Act, and the ethical requirements of the Accounting Professional and Ethical Standards Board's APES 110 *Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants (including Independence Standards)* (the Code) that are relevant to our audit of the financial report in Australia. We have also fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the Code.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our qualified opinion.

Responsibilities of the Management Committee for the financial report

The Management Committee of the Foundation are responsible for the preparation of the financial report that gives a true and fair view in accordance with the Australian Accounting Standards, General Purpose – Simplified Disclosure Requirements, and the ACNC Act, and for such internal control as the Management Committee determines is necessary to enable the preparation of the financial report that gives a true and fair view and is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial report, the Management Committee are responsible for assessing the Foundation's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Foundation or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

As part of an audit in accordance with the Australian Auditing Standards, we exercise professional judgement and maintain professional scepticism throughout the audit. We also:


